A Catholic Education

Saint Benedict's will be a Catholic school under the umbrella of the Institute of Christ King Sovereign Priest. The spirit of the school will be rooted in the teaching and tradition of the Catholic Church. St. Benedict's will form children through the teaching of the Church and the pursuit of truth, goodness and beauty. All the supernatural and human values of Christian civilization will be promoted, highlighting the harmony between Culture and Christianity.

How will this be done?

- Intellectual formation based on traditional and classical pedagogy.
- Spiritual formation rooted in the Magisterium of the Catholic Church and nourished by the celebration of the Sacraments in the Extraordinary Form of the Roman Rite
- Moral values will be cultivated in a healthy, honest and joyful atmosphere. Pupils will be encouraged to take on responsibilities
- Our patrons will be the patrons of the Institute: St. Benedict for the spiritual life and Sacraments, St. Thomas Aquinas for our studies and St. Francis de Sales for friendship and Charity.

Why Saint Benedict?

St. Benedict founded the roots of Europe so his patronage will help us to establish an oasis of Culture and Faith for the children of our school and their families.

In order to get to the Benedictine notion of community we have to step back in time to the 5th Century in southern Italy, when a man, whom we might nowadays describe as a college drop-out, gathered around himself a group of young men interested in seeking God together. Some of them may have been well educated but they didn't intend to start a college. What they wanted was a school of the Lord's service and their teacher was to be the man who had

discontinued his studies in Rome because its worldly environment was not what he sought. His name was Benedict.

The Rule he wrote for his monks is generally credited with playing a major role in preserving the learning of the past and creating a social fabric that would provide security and stability for new growth in Christian Europe.

The monasteries that he founded and the Rule that governed them are stamped with his deep respect for the person and his unerring sense of proportion. The Rule of Benedict has been used by countless generations of monks and nuns, and has also served as a model for many other civic and social bodies. it has helped to form the very fabric of Christian Culture in Europe.



Overleaf you can see some of the work that must be done to make classrooms, playgrounds, a refectory etc.

In the meantime though, our little pioneers aren't going to hang around! On 21st November 2017 lessons will be starting next to the new Shrine Church of the English Martyrs. (The Canons of the Institute received from our bishop the care of this beautiful Pugin church on 24th September and it is now a shrine of the Lancaster Diocese, dedicated to the English martyrs). The church has some rooms that we will use temporarily as classrooms but we need help towards staff and resources.




Right: Just behind the convent, in the shade of the church and its famous Spire, is the future playground in need of resurfacing and drainage.













The hall and rooms we will use initially, next to English Martyrs'
